Jeff Belle is a candidate for Congress in California's 52nd Congressional District, bringing more than a decade of experience in business, education, health policy, and public service to his campaign. Before returning to public life, Belle served as CEO of a San Diego-based investor relations firm supporting life-sciences companies across biotechnology, agricultural technology, and biopharmaceuticals.

From 2014 to 2018, Belle served as an elected member of the Contra Costa County Board of Education, including as Vice Chair and Budget Chair, representing approximately 180,000 students across 19 school districts. During his tenure, he earned recognition for his work in charter school authorization, parliamentary procedure, special-needs education, and education policy and legislative affairs.

Belle began building his public-policy experience through internships in Washington, D.C., including work for a U.S. Senator focused on health care and business issues, as well as with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General's Congressional Liaison Office.

Following his time in Washington, Belle worked as a lobbyist representing tribal governments, businesses, and health care organizations in Oklahoma and Washington, D.C. He also served as a circuit-rider city manager for five small towns in east-central Oklahoma, helping communities pursue Community Development Block Grant and economic-development funding, while building public-private partnerships to support local growth.

Belle holds a bachelor's degree in political science and a Master of Public Administration, with an emphasis in health policy.

Drawing on his experience in business, education, health policy, local government, and legislative affairs, Belle seeks to bring practical, bipartisan leadership to South Bay and San Diego. His campaign focuses on job creation, sustainable economic development, sound budgeting, and delivering results for local communities.
